

# PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

We were once again faced with multiple challenges this past year. In addition to the closure of our Canton reuse site and reduced staffing in our Worcester reuse site, we began our year in fiscal uncertainty as the state grappled with the impact of COVID on business revenues. In July 2020, we received a contract to maintain us for six months while the state tried to project what federal and state resources would be available ahead.

The pandemic also had a substantial impact on our day-to-day operations of refurbishing gently used durable medical equipment. We implemented new pandemic protocols, including: no-contact deliveries, no drop-off of donations, quarantining requirements for equipment before evaluation and refurbishment, vigorous use of personal protective equipment, and more.

Despite these myriad challenges, we had our best year ever for delivering refurbished equipment. We provided 1,533 pieces valued at \$2.3M to seniors, adults and children with disabilities, and veterans in Massachusetts, and our state contract was later extended to the whole year.

We additionally provided information to equipment recipients about vaccine eligibility, how to sign up for an appointment, and available resources. We petitioned legislators and the Baker administration to provide in-home vaccinations for the homebound due to disability, and we advocated for MassHealth to pay for transportation to vaccination and testing sites.

The pandemic slowed us down, but it did not knock us out. We survived and thrived. Not only have we improved lives; our program has also saved public and private insurers—as well as individuals paying out of pocket—millions of dollars, by giving valuable equipment a second life and keeping it out of landfills.

# **ABOUT OUR PROGRAM**

REquipment collects and refurbishes gently-used durable medical equipment (DME) for distribution, free of charge, to seniors, veterans and people with disabilities of all ages. The REquipment Durable Medical Equipment Reuse Program is a private-public partnership between three state agencies and six private, not-for-profit organizations. REquipment, Inc is the coordinating entity for this partnership.

First piloted in Greater Boston in 2014, the program has since reassigned over 5,000 pieces of DME statewide, representing significant savings to Medicaid and other insurance programs. Nearly \$10 million worth of devices—ranging from power wheelchairs to shower benches—have gone to residents to assist with their activities of daily living. People who request our equipment come from all over the state and use it to maintain their independence, keep their jobs, and stay safe in their homes and out of facilities.

#### **PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS**

**REquipment is statewide!** People browse and request available DME from our online inventory at dmereuse.org.

**Refurbished equipment** includes manual and power wheelchairs, scooters, sling lifts, rollator walkers, shower chairs, portable ramps and other adapted devices.

**Equipment is provided at no cost** to individuals and families in Massachusetts who request devices.

**Pickup and delivery**—a vital service to our program users—is available.

**REquipment is also reachable by phone**. People who don't use computers can call us to arrange donations or to ask questions. Call us toll-free at 1-800-261-9841

REquipment DME & AT Reuse Program, Inc. operates the MassMATCH REquipment DME reuse program through a contract with the Massachusetts Rehabilitation Commission. The Department of Development Services (DDS) and the DPH-funded Pappas Rehabilitation Hospital for Children (PRHC) provide in-kind support for two reuse sites.

# WHY REQUIPMENT MATTERS

REquipment is the only durable medical equipment (DME) reuse program in the state to provide refurbishment of power chairs. Power chairs are the most time-consuming and costly DME to refurbish and this work requires staff with specific skills to perform.

In FY21, we provided 132 power wheelchairs and 33 scooters to individuals who needed a backup while theirs was being repaired or a new one ordered. Our chair meant they could continue to work, attend school, perform daily life activities, and prevent secondary health conditions.

Sometimes all it takes is a few pieces of equipment to keep a senior at home. These include a rollator for walking stability, a lightweight transport wheelchair for family to push them for appointments, and a tub seat for shower safety. Although this equipment is low-cost, some seniors cannot afford it and Medicare will often not pay for these items. Our program makes the difference in their independence.

Our delivery of an adaptive bike or sports equipment or a two-seater trike for the youngest recipients makes it possible for individuals with disabilities to get out with their family and friends and enjoy what it feels like to ride a bike and be a part of the group, boosting their quality of life and sense of well-being.



These are only a few examples of the impact that a device from REquipment has on residents and their families. We thank our supporters—from the state of Massachusetts, to individual donors of funding and gently used durable medical equipment, to our partners in the community. We could not do this life-changing work without you.




# **COMMUNITY PARTNERS**

# Cape Organization for the Rights of the Disabled (CORD)

This year, REquipment announced a new partnership with CORD's Mobile Food Pantry. CORD is the independent living center that serves individuals with disabilities on the Cape and Islands and its Mobile Food Pantry serves thousands of residents with disabilities who can't get to food pantries. CORD's bus removes access barriers by bringing food closer to where people with disabilities live, increasing food security, and improving health. REquipment does not have a physical presence on the Cape.

Getting the word out about our program has been a challenge there. The visibility of that bright yellow bus inspired us to purchase ad space and help support its mission. Now, as the bus travels up and down the Cape, REquipment's logo and message is carried with it. We are thrilled to join together in this way and help promote food security and greater independence and safety at home and in the community. We hope to see an increase in equipment requests and donations from Cape residents as a result of this partnership.





#### **Legislative Advocacy**

At the start of FY21, REquipment was faced with an 80% budget cut and only a six-month funding contract due to the uncertainty of the state and federal budget. We tightened our belts and remained open with the assistance of the Federal Payroll Protection Program and an SBA Economic Injury Disaster Loan. We worked closely with legislators through forums hosted by Easter Seals in February and March 2021, which resulted in the restoration of \$630 million to the DME Reuse Program and Assistive Technology Programs. Our Massachusetts legislators understand the value of the DME Reuse Program!

# **COMMUNITY PARTNERS (cont.)**

#### **COVID Public Health Outreach**

In the early stages of the pandemic, REquipment used Facebook to disseminate information about COVID, such as recommendations and requirements around the use of masks and personal protection (PPE), social distancing, frequent handwashing, and public health announcements. Later, we posted information about vaccine eligibility requirements, times/locations of vaccine clinics, testing information, and more. We "friended" many state legislators' FB pages, sharing their information and advocated through them for a state vaccination program for those homebound due to disability or lack of affordable, accessible transportation and therefore unable to get to mass vaccination sites.

We shared 49 "posts" and four blogs to amplify the message of scientifically verified COVID-related information. In February 2021, responding to Senator Harriette Chandler's request to take a role in getting people with disabilities vaccinated, we developed a COVID Information Fact Sheet. The fact sheet was distributed alongside deliveries to 556 equipment recipients. If the pandemic lasts, we will play a role in ensuring we get information to the people we serve.



#### **Chelsea Soldiers' Home**

A tremendous thank-you to the Chelsea Soldiers' Home for their collaboration on two large donations totaling 50 items. We are grateful for their transfer of 30 manual wheelchairs, two geriatric chairs, two power wheelchairs, 14 rollators, and more. The Chelsea Soldiers' Home Coordinator commented, "Glad we can help with such a wonderful and amazing cause. You made my day!" We hope to maintain this collaborative relationship that benefits MA seniors, veterans and individuals with disabilities across the state.

This chair gave my husband the ability to do some of the simplest things in life that most may take for granted. In his final days, my husband was able to go outside and enjoy fresh air and even walk our dog which was so amazing to see (I recorded it). The first time he got in the chair and went out the door, he left track marks on our front lawn. I think he thought he was riding a Harley or driving a Maserati. Either way, the rubber hit the road and he was in his "glory days." Of course, I think he was showing off a little bit, too, trying to impress me. Imagine that, 23 years of marriage and he was still trying to impress me.

We both underestimated the power of this chair because it had nothing do with the motor, albeit powerful. You see, the power of the chair was about the "glory days" he felt while using it in ways that would not have been possible without this chair. Even if it was for just a short time. I hope you find those moments as well! I will leave one last thought, below, which I whole-heartedly believe:
